View From the Porch

This is the first newsletter that we have produced since October of last year. While we were forced by Covid-19 to suspend our mansion tours and other activities, our trustees continued to assist members and others answering reference questions, processing new artifacts and accessions, managing the organization's business affairs, and maintaining our Smith-Cadbury headquarters at 12 High Street. In acknowledgement of the hardship the pandemic presented to our members we extended all memberships until June of this year, when we sent out our membership drive communication. We appreciate the positive response that we have received to it so far.

As of the day of the publication of this newsletter, I am happy to report that it is our plan to re-open the Smith-Cadbury Mansion for in-person visits and tours, beginning on Sunday, September 12th. As in the past, we will be open on the second and fourth Sundays of each month, from 1-3 PM and every Tuesday from 1-4 PM. Any changes that need to be made to this schedule, Covid-related and otherwise, will be posted on our website www.moorestownhistory.org. We ask those planning on visiting the building to please wear a mask in an abundance of caution.

The exhibit committee is busy working on a new exhibit which we plan to debut in conjunction with the re-opening of Smith-Cadbury in September. *Back to School* will trace the history of Moorestown's public and private schools. On display will be items from the Historical Society's extensive collection of photographs, textbooks, furniture and other memorabilia from bygone eras. Visitors will get a glimpse into the life of a student dating back to the early 19th and early 20th centuries.

Also available to exhibit-goers will be our large collection of Moorestown High School yearbooks. Dating back to the earliest yearbook publications, some visitors will be able to look up their parents, grandparents, and great-grandparents, and get a glimpse of what life was like for them when they were students.

In October we will resume our New Jersey History Speaks lecture series. The first will be in conjunction with our fall membership meeting on October 6th, beginning at 7 p.m. Our speaker will be Mooretown resident Matt Skic, who is a curator at Museum of the American Revolution in Philadelphia. He will discuss the Museum's exhibit When Women Lost the Vote. His presentation will touch on the little-known history of America's first women voters who predated the passage of the 19th amendment. Included in Matt's presentation will be information on early women voters in our area. As we go to print, this is scheduled to be a virtual meeting, the details of which will be found on our website as we get closer to the date. The possibility also exists that the Moorestown Public Library may reopen its meeting rooms, in which case it will be changed to an in-person meeting. If that is the case, that change will be reflected on our website as well.

Some faces have changed on our board since the last newsletter was published. Lynn Brill, who served as recording secretary for 24 years, has stepped down to spend more time with her large family. She could always be counted on to participate in all our programs and fund-raising activities. She was a dedicated member and will be missed very much by all of us.



Our New Jersey History Speaks Lecture Series returns...

When Women Lost the Vote: A Museum of the American Revolution Presentation

OCTOBER 6th @ 7 PM

Annual Meeting & the kickoff of the new season of the NJ History Speaks Lecture Series

Millions of American women were granted the right to vote with the ratification of the 19th Amendment in 1920. But did you know that more than a century earlier, women legally held the right to vote in New Jersey? In a groundbreaking exhibition, the **Museum of the American Revolution** explored the little-known history of the nation's first women voters — and examined the political conflicts that led to their voting rights being stripped away in 1807.

Join us when we host one of the museum's researchers and get an inside look at the Museum's newest exhibition, *When Women Lost the Vote: A Revolutionary Story, 1776-1807*.

Learn the little-known history of the nation's first women voters including women who lived in and around Moorestown. Get a virtual peek at artifacts that tell their stories and bring to life the women who laid the foundation for the suffragists two generations later.

Mark your calendars for the next NJ History Speaks Lecture: November 10th @ 7 PM

"This is a transcription of a poll list from a state election held at a schoolhouse in Moorestown, Chester Township, in October 1807. This list of voters includes the names of 38 women that cast their ballots just one month before the New Jersey State Legislature passed a bill defining voters as white, male citizens. The closing of the electorate effectively stripped the vote from women and free people of color in New Jersey."

A number of voters on this list have yet to be identified. The Museum of the American Revolution is continuing its research, contact them if you know more about any of the voters.



LIBRARY NEWS

As we slowly return to post-pandemic normal, the HSM library staff is excited to welcome back members and researchers, following CDC and state safety guidelines. During

the pandemic we've still been processing new accessions and maintaining our Facebook page with its popular "Forgotten Friday" feature. We've continued to answer researchers' numerous history questions in both email and on Facebook. And research for the plaque program has continued with only slight delays.

This fall the Historical Society will present a "Back to School" exhibit which will feature many items from the library's archives and photo collection. The exhibit will include the handwritten textbooks of several Moorestown students and teachers from the distant past.


Abigail C. Hugg was the daughter of Joseph and Deborah Matlack Hugg. She was born in 1799 in Woodbury, NJ and is thought to have lived at the Hugg Family homestead in Mt. Laurel near Elbow Lane Road. She was interred at the Newton Burying Grounds in 1832. Her cyphering book is dated July 23rd, AD 1814, "under the care and superintendancy of Joseph W. Bennett, Pr. F. S." She also had an undated Grammar Book with detailed rules of syntax and definitions of grammatical terms.

In the late 18th and early 19th centuries, when paper was scarce and expensive, mathematics students would create their own handwritten textbooks, usually copied from a teacher's cypher book. They were sometimes


written with the help of their teacher which might explain the different handwriting styles in the books. The rules, examples and exercises would be useful throughout the life of the student. Often a teacher would use the cyphering book from their childhood in the education of their students.

by Esther Roberts, a woman of strong character who was greatly loved by her pupils." She was born in 1778 to John and Phebe Andrews Roberts. Hers is an excellent example of a more advanced American cyphering book, the first page of which is inscribed with her name, her school and the date 10 month --- 1823. She probably used this book in the teaching of mathematics to her students.

Elizabeth H. Moore (1838-1862) lived with her parents (Martha and William) and siblings in the house just east of the old town hall. Her sketchbook from 1856 shows the work of an accomplished young artist. She was a student at the Quaker West Grove Boarding School in Chester County, Pennsylvania.




Hannah Lippincott (b. 1853) was a student at Mary Lippincott's Boarding School on the north side of East Main Street near Stanwick during the 1860s. Her father was Levi Lippincott, a Moorestown farmer. Mary Lippincott's husband, Isaac, was her great-great uncle. The Historical Society's archive has several of her school books from her time at the Moorestown Boarding School including autograph books from 1866 and 1869, an English copy book from 1867, and several penmanship workbooks. She continued her education after 1869 at the Bellevue Institute in Langhorne, PA for which we have

two additional copy books. Her copy book from 1867 contains a poem written about her school and classmates. Her penmanship

As we put this issue of the newsletter together — due to the COVID-19 pandemic, our first since an October 2020 issue where we featured information about how Moorestown dealt with the 1918 pandemic and how to attend our Annual Meeting, NJ History Speaks lectures, and Ghost Tours remotely via Zoom — we are living through a severe spike in COVID-19 cases. 
